



Call for Abstracts

Abstract submission opens on September 3, 2012 and closes on February 15, 2013. Submitting authors from OECD countries (for a list please visit <http://www.oecd.org>) are required to pay the IUIS fee of 50 euro/submitted abstract. No payment for abstract submission is due by authors from non-OECD countries. Instructions for abstract submission will be available at the website <http://www.ici2013.org>

Language: All abstracts must be written in English.

Title and Abstract: Include in the title of the abstract all the words critical for a subject index. The body of your abstract should no be more than 250 words. Figures or tables may not be used.

Keywords: Authors should select up to five keywords to help others find the abstract.

Support: Enter the source(s) of contributed support. Grant numbers may be listed here.

Travel grant awardees will not pay any registration fee and will be offered hospitality in a University hostel (Expo College 2) for the entire congress period. Travel expenses of the winners will not be covered by ICI 2013. Applicants winning travel grants from other sources will be requested to choose only one of them. 

Access to the City

Milan has three airports: Malpensa, Linate and Orio al Serio Airport. The latter one is used mainly by low cost flights.

MILANO MALPENSA AIRPORT

Milano Malpensa, the most important International airport in northern Italy, is located 48 Km north-west of Milan and can be easily reached by public transportation (bus and rail services).

Malpensa Express:

Rail connections from Piazza Cadorna Station and Milan Central Station to Malpensa airport.

Milan Cadorna-Malpensa

41 trains, one every 30 minutes in both directions.

MILANO LINATE AIRPORT

Milano Linate is located just 7 km from Milan city centre. It can be reached from Milan Central Station with bus number 73.

MILANO ORIO AL SERIO AIRPORT

Milan Orio al Serio airport is located 45 km from Milan city center. It is connected by bus to the Milan Central Station.


Congress Venue

General Information

Passport & Visa European Citizens whose countries are in the Schengen Area can enter Italy on a valid identity card or passport. They include all the countries of the European Union and the European Economic Area: Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Lichtenstein, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, United Kingdom, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Bulgaria, Estonia, Croatia, Latvia, Lithuania, Malta, Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia.

Citizens from all other countries must show their passports and, where a visa is required, this must be presented to the border authorities, indicating the length of the holder's stay and his or her destination. Visa applications - specifying the reason for the trip - must be obtained at the Italian Consulate in the applicant's country of residence and are generally issued 90 days after application.

Nationals bearing ordinary passports of the following countries/regional configurations are subject to visa obligations:

As visa regulations are continuously changing, we strongly recommend you to consult the official website of the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs (www.esteri.it/visti/) for updated and detailed information for foreigners regarding entrance visas for Italy and permits of stay. Information is offered in English and other languages.

Climate & Clothing August in Milan is relatively hot and sunny. The average low and high temperature in the third week of August is 20 - 30°C, respectively. Light clothing is suitable for day time, and a light jacket may be useful for the night.

Language In Milan, visited year round by tourists from all over the world, English is currently spoken.

Money The Italian currency is the Euro, "EUR = €." Exchange rates of participating countries are locked into a common currency. Notes come in denominations of €500, €200, €100, €50, €20, €10 and €5. Coins are in denominations of €2 and €1, and 50, 20, 10, five, two and one cents.

ATMs ATMs (known in Italy as bancomat) are widely available in Milan and most will accept cards tied into the Visa, Amex, MasterCard, Cirrus and Maestro systems. As a precaution, though, check that the appropriate logo is displayed on the ATM before inserting your card. Banks opening hours are 08:30 to 13:30 and 14:45 to 15:45, Monday to Friday.

Credit cards Major cards such as Visa, MasterCard, Eurocard, Cirrus, Amex and Eurocheques are widely accepted.

Travellers cheques Travellers cheques are accepted almost everywhere. Those in Euros, Pounds Sterling or US Dollars are the easiest to cash.

Taxes & refunds A value-added tax of around 21% is included in the price of just about everything in Italy. Non-EU residents who spend more than €155 at shops with a 'Tax Free for Tourists' sticker are entitled to a tax rebate. You will need to fill in a form in the shop and get it stamped by customs as you leave Italy.

Tipping In Italy service, which usually ranges from 1 to 3 Euros depending on the restaurant, is automatically added to the check and must be visible on the menu. Therefore, there is no need to tip. Normally, however, Italians just round up the bill, by a few Euros.

Hotel staff, such as luggage handlers, happily accepts a small tip.

Generally, no other public service workers expect tips.

Also remember to take your receipt, even if paying cash. It is required by the law as you must be able to prove that you paid and the owner rang it in for tax purposes.

Electricity Electric appliances in Italy work at 220 volts, CA. 50 Hz and plugs conform to the European system of round pins with two holes.
